### **Two- Year Partnership Program Designed To Help Feds Develop Better Working Relationship With Nampa & Meridian Irrigation District**

and Washington. A two-day session was also held in August with NMID.

The group will tour NMID facilities November 14-15 and will get an inside look at the work that goes on at irrigation districts when the canals are empty of water.

The upcoming two days give the BOR participants a closer look at the operation of an irrigation district when canals are dry and highlights maintenance activities. This includes work such as lining canals with concrete, replacing open canals with underground pipes, repairing bank erosion problems, replacing headgates and preparing and collecting irrigation taxes, etc.

The exchanges mean the Bureau can share information directly with staff at the District about the wide range of water related tasks the agency does such as GIS mapping, water supply studies, engineering design and AgriMet weather stations. It also helps irrigation district personnel get a better handle on who are the best points of contact in the BOR organization.

NMID will host the program and conduct two more sessions again next year.

“The first of our sessions in August was designed to education the Federal employees about what we do and how we do it when the canals are full and we are delivering water. It was a great success and we are looking forward to a similar outcome with this session, said Daren Coon, NMID Secretary Treasurer

The program is named after the late John Keys III who headed the Bureau’s Pacific Northwest Region and later served as the Reclamation Commissioner.

“We feel this partnership provides valuable benefits both to us and the Irrigation District,” said Duncan F. Nims, Regional Learning Officer with the Bureau who oversees the program for BOR.

The Nampa & Meridian Irrigation District is a water storage, conveyance and distribution system founded in 1904. NMID supplies irrigation water to than 17,000 individual parcels of land, including 479 subdivisions in Ada and Canyon counties.
